Removing Financial Barriers for Museum Visitors: Museums for All

Founded in 2014, *Museums for All* is a nationwide, cooperative initiative between the Association of Children's Museums (ACM) and the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) aimed to remove financial barriers for museum visitors, encourage families of all backgrounds to visit museums regularly, and build lifelong museum habits. Museums for All encourages community partnerships, peer to peer learning, and serves as an entry point for museums to address equitability. Today there are over 960 participating museums across the country, and the US Virgin Islands with a total of 4.5 million people visiting museums through this program since it began.

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MANY Board Spotlight: Joshua Ruff



Joshua Ruff is the Deputy Director and Director of Collections & Interpretation at the Long Island Museum of American Art, History & Carriages, in Stony Brook. He is a graduate of Syracuse University with a dual major in Broadcast Journalism and in History, and Stony Brook University with a MA in History. Ruff has worked at the Long Island Museum for 25 years including as Curator of its History and Carriage Collections and has curated more than 60 exhibitions.

Recently named the next co-Executive Director of the Long Island Museum and elected to the MANY board this past April, we spoke with Ruff to learn more about this museum experience and what his new position will look like.

As summer comes to a close and we begin to gear up for a busy fall, I am excited to report on "Museums Support Democracy," our webinar series produced in partnership with Museum Hue and funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities and Humanities New York. The seven programs featured fifteen museum professionals from around the nation discussing Citizenship, Environmental Justice, Ethical Collecting and Deaccessioning, Expanding Interpretive Lenses, Healing Historical Legacies, Museums and Civil Rights, and Protest Through Visual and Performance Art. 869 people from 48 states, Puerto Rico, the District of Columbia, the US Virgin Islands, as well as Barbados, Canada, China, Hungary, Mexico, Spain, Sweden, and the United Kingdom participated in the webinars.

Support for NYS history-related organizations

We're partnering with the William G. Pomeroy Foundation for a fifth round of the Pomeroy Fund for NYS History, providing a total of \$100,000 for salary support/hourly wages to bring back or hire museum educators.

This round of funding offers grants in amounts up to and including \$5,000 for salary support/hourly wages to bring back or hire museum educators who will plan and deliver interpretative educational programs.

These may include:

- · school programs,
- teen programs,
- early childhood programs,
- · family days,
- festivals,
- · programs for older adults,
- nrograms for new Americans

 or targeted, audience-specific programs identified in the grant application.

Funding <u>should not</u> be used as a substitute for existing (budgeted) staff salaries and hours, but can be used to increase staff hours for the aforementioned purposes.

Funds will be granted to museums for education staff who will offer in-person programming, but programs may include a virtual component.

Open to eligible 501c3 history-related organizations in New York State with budgets up to \$250,000. Town historians and municipally owned historical societies are ineligible. Applicants do not need to be members of MANY to apply.

Preservation League of NYS Technical Assistance Grants

Technical Assistance Grants (TAG) are available to eligible NYS nonprofits and municipalities. This program provides support for consulting projects that preserve New York State's cultural and historic resources. The grants will support professional services of architects, engineers, and other design and preservation professionals. Grants of up to \$4,000, with a required 20% project cost match from each applicant are available to popposit project.

and municipalities that own or have a long-term lease on buildings that house historic sites, museums, arts facilities, and other important institutions that serve an arts or cultural purpose and are open to the public.

Now through November 15, museums and related organizations across the U.S. have six opportunities to apply for grants from the nation's primary source of federal funding for museum services. The Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) is now accepting applications for six grant programs:

- Museums for America
- Inspire! Grants for Small Museums
- Museums Empowered
- National Leadership Grants for Museums
- · Museum Grants for African American History and Culture
- Native American/Native Hawaiian Museum Services

At IMLS, we are looking to reach and support museums of all sizes and disciplines through our existing programs," said Laura Huerta Migus, Deputy Director of Museum Services. "These grant programs fund all types of projects that support museums' work in their communities, whether through direct service or by increasing their institutional capacity. We encourage all museums to consider applying and to contact IMLS staff if you have questions about which grant program best fits your needs."

Collaborative Grant Opportunity with OurStoryBridge, Inc.

OurStoryBridge, Inc. is a 501(c)(3) charitable nonprofit (and MANY Industry Partner) that preserves and circulates local audio stories past and present through accessible online media; promotes, builds, and assists with the deployment of these resources in communities across geographic, cultural, socioeconomic, racial, and organizational strata; and helps to strengthen these communities through the sharing of their stories, including preserving the stories of older generations before they are lost and encouraging younger generations to become engaged community members. We provide a free, online tool kit and additional resources for libraries, museums, historical societies, or issue-orientation organizations to launch their own story projects.

Pending grant funding support, we plan to lead a new story project initiative for the collective Champlain-Adirondack Biosphere region. To this end, the Champlain Valley National Heritage Partnership has a current grant opportunity that could support us and you in this effort and we are looking for collaborating partners! OurStoryBridge will facilitate the grant submission and implementation.
